

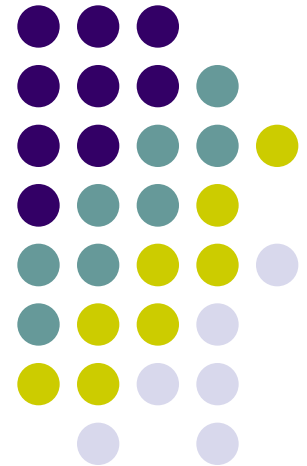

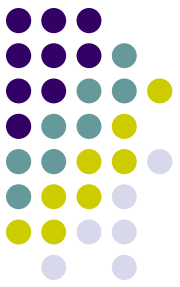

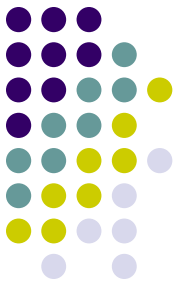
Background

- Commissioning Framework for Health and Well-being (March 2007)
- Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act (October 2007)
- Provisions came into effect in April 2008 as a statutory requirement in relation to needs assessment
- Role of PCTs in developing JSNAs to be assessed by Healthcare Commission as part of Core Standards for 2008/09 (Seventh Domain: Public Health)
- Also reviewed by GONW as part of ongoing process of LAA scrutiny, review and refresh



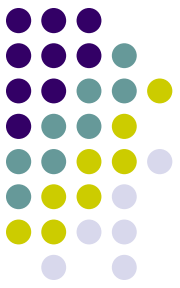
What it is

- Description of “the future health, care and well-being needs of local populations and the strategic direction of service delivery to meet these needs” (Dept of Health)
- Common baseline to underpin the development of the Community Strategy, Local Area Agreement (LAA) and Commissioning Strategic Plan (CSP)
- Tool for use by commissioners within both health and social care
- A starting point!



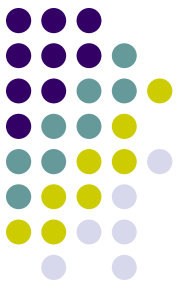
What it isn't

- An 'super' information profile of the City
- A detailed commissioning strategy
- An academic exercise
- A one-off piece of work



How did we do it?

- Multi-agency Working Group established
- Overall sponsorship by Public Service Board (PSB)
- Compilation of data from existing information reports, strategy documents and needs assessments
- Common framework for each chapter/sub-section
- Input from policy leads for relevant topic areas
- Cross-referenced with existing strategies to ensure consistency of approach and recommendations



Milestones

- December 2007 - Project Initiation Document (PID) agreed
- May 2008 - First draft presented to Manchester Public Service Board (PSB)
- June/July 2008 - Presentation to PCT Board, Adults Health and Wellbeing Partnership and Children's Board
- July/August 2008 – Presentations to PBC Hub Boards
- October 2008 – Full reference document and public summary signed off
- November 2008 – Formal launch at IHiM Conference

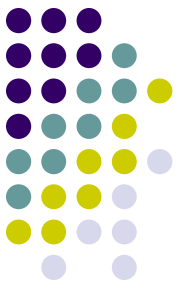
Content

2008–2013

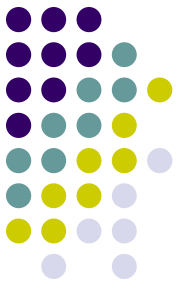
- Local commissioning context, including existing service provision
- Current population needs, drivers for change and their likely impact
- Mixture of text, data tables and charts/maps
- “What do commissioners need to consider?” boxes



Topics covered

- Population and neighbourhoods
- Socio-economic and environmental factors
- Mothers, children and young people
- Lifestyle, risk-taking behaviours and infectious diseases
- Long term conditions, chronic diseases and disability

Example of contents – Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)



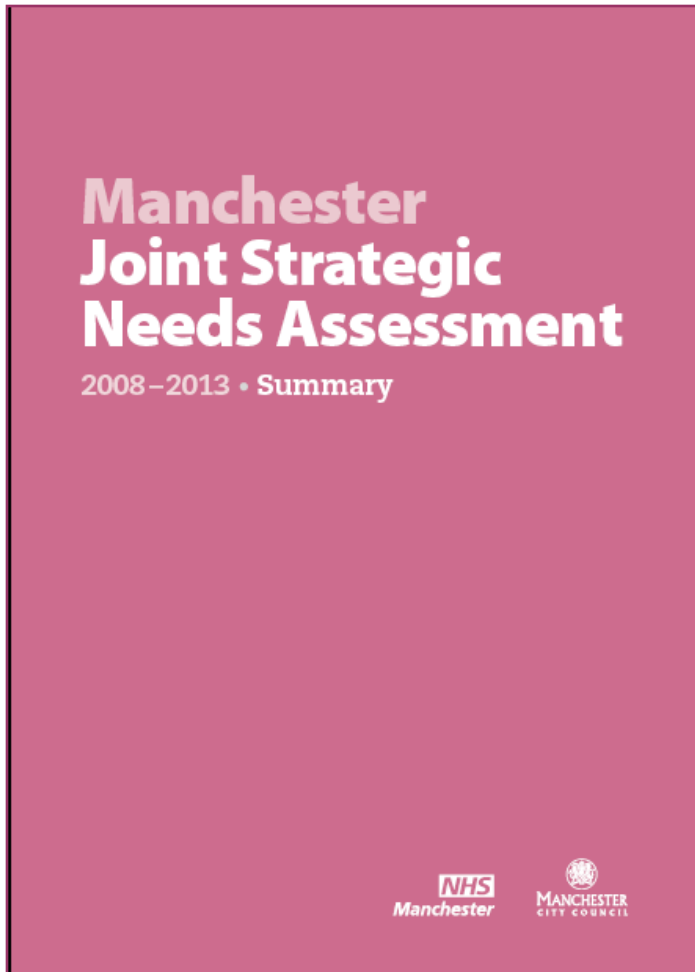
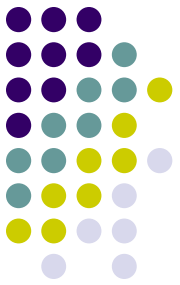
Headline statistics

- National models suggest that there are approx. 16,500 people with COPD in Manchester (5.5% of the population aged 15 and over).
- The prevalence of COPD in Manchester is higher than the England average but lower than other comparable cities (e.g. Liverpool, Newcastle)
- Between 2005 and 2007, 146 people presented to Adult Social Care due to COPD.

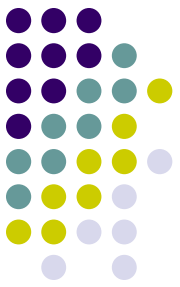
What do commissioners need to consider (examples)?

- Use of spirometry in schools and community pharmacies to test lung function
- Investment in social marketing programmes to support public health messages about the links between smoking and COPD
- Identify models of service provision to support the care needs of people using Individual Budgets

Public summary

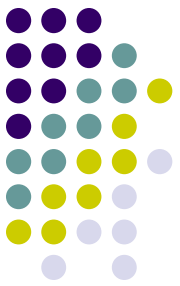


- Local community and user engagement throughout JSNA process
- Representation on Working Group through LINK
- Talking Health online public questionnaire (PCT)
- Public summary highlights five key areas: childhood obesity; teenage pregnancy; alcohol; falls and long-term conditions



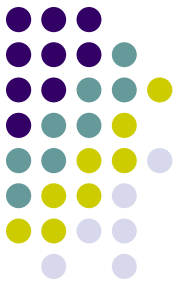
Benefits to Adult Social Care

- Adult Social Care transformation priorities reflected throughout e.g. Reablement, Individual Budgets, Assistive Technology, Support for Carers
- Demonstrates ASC contribution to management of long term health conditions
- Strengthens case for joint commissioning: Dementia, Stroke, Integrated Community Teams, Intermediate Care, Carers
- Provides a baseline for commissioners and evidence source for external funding bids
